After the introduction, the founder and chief executive officer of Second Chance Educational Alliance Inc., Erin Corbett, delivered the keynote address to the audience

Corbett was presented with the Community Partner Award for her dedication and commitment to broadening post-secondary opportunities for populations of all backgrounds.

During the actual expo, students involved in more than 30 projects presented posters around the lobby and showed how they were able to give back to the community in a

meaningful way.

The following awards were issued to the participants during the awards ceremony:

• Going Green Award: Warrior Food Recovery Program, an effort to reduce food waste on campus as well as help the community by donating the food to the Covenant Soup Kitchen.

The participants were Wali Mohammod and Zac Stygar.

• Best New Program: Boy's Circle at Natchaug Elementary School in

Willimantic, whose mission is to improve behavior inside and outside the classroom.

The participants were Dillon Antonopoulos and Joseph Hacia.

 Broadening Horizons Award: Windham High School English as a Second Language mentoring, which seeks to assist students in the ESOL program in various school subjects.

"The program fit the award criteria for promoting economic stabil-

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ity," said Ellen Lang, who presented the award to participant Italo Bucca.

• Leadership Development Award: Girl's Circle at Natchaug Elementary School, whose purpose is to provide the fourth- and fifth-grade girls with opportunities to grow into strong women.

The participant was Amanda Peterson.

• Strengthening Communities Award: Windham Recovery Center Jobs 101, a program as part of the Connecticut Community for Addiction Recovery (CCAR).

CCAR allowed the students to get involved in recovery meetings by assisting the individuals with finding jobs and improving their resumes.

The participants were Katelyn Root and Ahna Harkness.

"We didn't just sit in on the meetings," said Harkness. "We were able to share our own personal stories with them and get involved."

- Putting Liberal Arts Into Action Award: Windham High School ESOL Mentoring.
- Kids First Award: Jumpstart, a national nonprofit organization that supports the development of language, literacy and social emotional skills in preschoolers from under-resourced communities.

"The program intends to close the gap between affluent areas and low income areas," Mowel and Hubley said on their exhibit.

Mowel, an ECSU junior who spends hours on efforts to positively impact the Greater Windham community through her involvement as a Jumpstart team leader and member of AmeriCorps.

- Faculty/Staff Community Engagement Award: Nancy Brennan, a member of Eastern's Foundation for Campus Ministry who has had an extensive commitment to service through organizing events like the Thursday Night Cafe at Eastern and a student-led food cupboard at Knight House called Shawn's Cupboard.
- Outstanding Community Event Award: Journey House Program of Natchaug Hospital in Mansfield, a specialized residential treatment program for girls ages 12 to

18 who have been referred from the juvenile justice system

The assistant program director, Christy Calkins, has been instrumental in being a dependable resource and coaching new volunteers yearly.

CCE Director Kimberly Armstrong Silcox thanked the volunteers for their work and the judges who took the time to learn about the projects.
