Text: Analysis with an Introduction to Proof, Fifth edition, Steven R. Lay.

Office hours: M and W 10:00-11:00 am, and 1:00-2:00 pm, F 1:00-2:00 pm.

Prerequisites: MAT 230, MAT 244, and MAT 315.

Course topics: A rigorous study of the real numbers system including the completeness axiom, sequences, limits, continuity, and uniform continuity. This course fulfills the University's requirement for an upper-division writing-intensive course.

Goals and Objectives: There are several important outcomes to achieve by the end of this course:

- Understanding of the structure of the field of real numbers and its particular properties, especially these following immediately from the Completeness axiom;
- Understanding the topology of real numbers, and the definition and properties of the various basic classes of sets: open, closed, and compact.
- Understanding the rigorous definition of convergence of sequences of real numbers and the resulting theorems, demonstrating a practical ability to apply these properties to specific examples;
- Understanding the rigorous definitions of limits and continuity of functions of one real variable and their equivalence, as well as the fundamental properties of continuous functions;
- Further developing the ability to understand and construct abstract mathematical proofs, applying theoretical knowledge to particular problems, with an emphasis on writing in accordance with the mathematical standards.

Class format: Each class meeting will consist of a lecture and include related problem solving. Attendance: It is expected that you be there on time for each and every class. If for some reason you should miss a class, then it is your responsibility to find out from a friend what has been covered and assigned and make it up.

Homework: After each class you will get a homework assignment. It will be collected and graded. I cannot stress enough the importance of doing the homework. In addition to being a substantial part of your grade, it is a critical factor in building and reinforcing your knowledge, as well as helping you identify your weak points. Homework should be written neatly on standard letter format paper on one side of the sheet only.

Portfolio: You must collect all your homework assignments in a binder, portfolio style. At the end of the semester you should have a complete set of these. This is a requirement to pass.

Quizzes: Quite often at the beginning of class time there will be a short quiz. This should keep you alert and following the material carefully, closely and timely.

Exams: There will be a midterm exam the date of which will be announced at least a week in advance.

Final Exam: There will be a cumulative final on Wed., Dec. 8, 2021, 2:00-4:00 pm.

Evaluation: Your work in this course will be weighted roughly as follows. The quizzes will account for 20% of your grade, the homework will account for 25%, the midterm exam will account for 25% and the final exam will account for the remaining 30%.

Grades: The ranges for the grades are the following:

Make-ups: There will be no make-ups for quizzes, since I will drop the lowest one. Make-ups for the midterm exam are strongly discouraged and might be allowed for truly exceptional reasons only, and with my prior permission.
