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This seminar has a dual focus: to analyze the depiction of "monstrous" women in literature and to explore what those portrayals reveal about what we imagine to be normal and natural. What must women do to be labeled as monstrous or deviant? By analyzing these representations, we are able to witness how this particular group of people began to embody social, religious, and political debates. We will also discuss what these women's supposed monstrosity reveal about their political and historical contexts, as well as how these texts were used to legitimate social paranoia.

Texts for our class may include Toni Morrison's *Beloved*, Charlotte Brontë's *Jane Eyre*, Jean Rhys's *Wide Sargasso Sea*, Sophie Treadwell's *Machinal*, Lillian Hellman's *The Children's Hour*, Elizabeth Alexander's *The Venus Hottentot*, and Charlaine Harris's *True Blood*.
