

Art History Concentration

Art History involves studying artworks within their stylistic, historical, and social contexts. The Art History Concentration aims to familiarize students with world art, both past and present, while deepening their understanding of artistic styles and the ways art reflects and perpetuates a culture's history, beliefs, and values. This concentration encourages students to explore how art serves as a powerful tool for cultural expression and historical insight.

Digital Art & Media Design Concentration

This concentration blends art fundamentals with design and digital media, emphasizing their cultural relevance. Students develop creative and critical thinking skills as they navigate the design process. This dynamic program offers courses in visual communication design, including print and screen design, illustration, animation, and client collaboration. Targeted coursework helps students build strong portfolios, culminating in a Capstone project that highlights their creativity and technical skills. Graduates pursue diverse careers in design across industries and often continue their education with graduate degrees.

Illustration Concentration

Illustration at Eastern encompasses multiple disciplines within the Art Major, offering students a variety of career opportunities. Illustrators work across numerous industries, both as freelancers and in full-time positions, often combining traditional techniques with digital tools to create their work. In addition to artistic skills, illustrators must develop business acumen to effectively market their work to clients or through agents. Career paths in illustration span a wide range of fields, including advertising, preproduction for film and TV, corporate and nonprofit organizations, book and editorial design, packaging, fashion, greeting cards, medical and scientific illustration, technical and architectural illustration, retail, and 3D illustration, among others.

Studio Art Concentration

This concentration provides a diverse range of courses encompassing both traditional techniques and experimental approaches, helping students build strong observational skills and refine their craftsmanship. Students gain hands-on experience in various media, including painting, drawing, sculpture, and mixed media, allowing them to explore different artistic methods and find their preferred medium of expression. This concentration prepares students not only for professional art practice but also for a wide array of creative careers and further graduate study.



Advising & Registration

- If you are a double major, you'll have one Faculty Advisor from each department. Once you declare the Art major, a Faculty Advisor from the Department of Art and Art History will be assigned to you automatically.

 Evaluation on eWeb. If no Faculty Advisor is listed, please reach out to the
 Department Chair for assistance. You can request a new advisor at any time.



General Advice

Be sure to check your Degree Evaluation (Degree Works) regularly to stay on track toward graduation. This tool provides a comprehensive overview of your progress, listing all degree requirements and showing which ones you've completed and which are still pending. While it's not an official document, it's an essential resource for both students and advisors when planning course registration and preparing for graduation.

To access your Degree Evaluation, go to the Eastern website > Current Students > eWeb > Academic Records > Degree Evaluation.

- Students are responsible for knowing all university and department requirements. Advisors are here to assist and answer questions.
- BEFORE meeting with the advisor, students must:
 - 1. Review the department and concentration requirements on the department website
 - 2. Review their Degree Evaluation on eWeb
 - 3. Make a list of courses they plan to take
- Key Requirements to Graduating on Time: Track these five items on your Degree Evaluation to make sure you graduate on time.
 - 1. Minimum 120 credits to graduate
 - 2. Liberal Arts Core requirements
 - 3. Portfolio Requirements (complete before planning to take 300-400 level courses)
 - **4.** University Writing requirements (complete in Sophomore and Junior years)
 - 5. Major and concentration Requirements
 - 6.30 credits must be 200 or higher; 30 credits must be 300 or higher

Registration Process



<u>Dates &</u> Deadlines Page

Step 1 - Check Information

At the beginning of each semester, be sure to check your Degree Evaluation to see how many credits have been applied toward your degree. Then, visit the Dates and Deadlines page to find your Advising Period and Registration Start Date. Staying informed will help you plan ahead, make the most of your advising sessions, and ensure timely registration.

Step 2 - Contact Your Faculty Advisor

It's your responsibility to schedule a meeting with your advisor during the designated advising period. Faculty schedules fill up quickly, so don't wait until the last minute—make your appointment early to ensure availability. You can find your assigned advisor in your Degree Evaluation, and then use the Faculty Information page to locate their contact details.

Step 3 - Registeration

Bring a draft list of the courses you plan to take, along with any questions you may have to the meeting. Be sure to get your unique Registration Code from your Faculty Advisor. Once registration opens for your class level, log in to eWeb and register as early as possible. If you run into any issues, contact your advisor or the Registrar's office right away for assistance.

Portfolio Requirement

A Portfolio is required for the following concentrations:

- Digital Art and Media Design
- Illustration
- Studio Art

After completing several foundation courses, students are required to submit a portfolio to enroll in 300-level (or higher) studio courses. Students whose portfolios do not meet standards may be required to take supplemental courses.

Credit Limits

The standard course load for a full-time student is 15 credits per semester. A full-time student must carry a minimum of 12 credits per semester to be considered full-time, but are able to register for up to 17 credits during the initial registration period. Dropping Courses


Dropping a course or courses should be carefully considered and undertaken only after discussion with your faculty advisor or The Advising Center. Dropping a course means the course is completely gone from the student's schedule and transcript. Any reduction in course load may affect a student's bill, eligibility for financial aid, participation in intercollegiate athletics, etc. Students may drop Fall and Spring full-semester courses through the second week (Add/Drop Deadline) of the semester using Self-Service (eWeb).

Withdrawal from Courses

Students who wish to reduce their course load AFTER the Add/Drop deadline must officially Withdraw from the course. Students need written approval from the their advisor to withdraw. A Withdrawn course still stays on a student's schedule and transcript, but they do NOT attend that course anymore and they will receive a grade of "W" for the course, (it does not affect their GPA though)

Credit / No Credit

Use eWeb to list a course Credit/No Credit (also known as Pass/Fail). Students remain enrolled in the course and must still attend and complete all work. A final grade of "D" or above will appear on the transcript as "CR" and give credits towards graduation. A grade of "F" will be listed as "NC" and will provide no credits. Neither grade contributes to GPA. C/NC courses do not count towards major requirements. See the webpage for further rules and restrictions.



Credit/No Credit

Incomplete Grades

Instructors may award the grade of "Incomplete" when students are temporarily unable to fulfill course requirements because of illness (documented) or other verifiable emergency. It is each student's responsibility to complete the work within six weeks after the beginning of the first full semester following the granting of the "Incomplete." If grades are not submitted by the deadline, an official grade of "F" will be recorded.

Prerequisites and Corequisites

A Prerequisite means a course or other requirement that a student must have taken prior to enrolling in a specific course. A Corequisite means a course or other requirement that a student must take at the same time as another course or requirement.

Declaring/Changing Your Major

All students must declare a major by the end of the semester in which they have accumulated 60 credit hours toward graduation. Students who have not declared a major, but who have accumulated 60 or more credit hours, may not be permitted to register for classes. Students entering with 60 or more transfer credits must declare a major by the end of their first semester on campus. Art majors must also declare a concentration.

Adding/Dropping A Minor

A minor consists of an approved planned program of study of at least 15 credits. In such cases where majors, minors, and liberal arts core curriculum share courses, a minimum of nine (9) credits must be unique to each minor.

CRITICAL THINKING

Critical thinking is the analysis and evaluation of complex ideas, artifacts, information, and arguments as a basis for formulating a well-reasoned belief, judgment, or conclusion. By practicing critical thinking skills, students develop the habits of questioning, evaluating, and forming educated judgments in preparation for the challenges of personal and professional lives.



ETHICAL REASONING

Ethical Reasoning requires students to recognize ethical issues, identify their own ethical positions and analyze other ethical perspectives in real-world situations in order to consider the impact of decisions and actions on other individuals, society, and the environment. Liberally educated students carefully consider how decisions and behaviors affect individuals, communities, and the world.



COMMUNICATION

Communication requires students to recognize and utilize the most appropriate means to address specific audiences in relevant contexts or genres in order to effectively inform or persuade. Liberally educated students convey their ideas in compelling ways to others. Effective communication involves expressing oneself clearly, accurately, and in a manner suited to the audience and occasion.




CREATIVITY

Creativity is the ability to utilize skills and strategies to synthesize ideas, perspectives, information, or materials in original and self-aware ways, and to use that synthesis to generate imaginative acts or products. Liberally educated students adapt and innovate in our rapidly changing world. Innovative thought and expression are used across the disciplines and in various work situations.



QUANTITATIVE LITERACY

Quantitative literacy is competency in working with numerical data to reason or solve problems, the ability to make judgements and draw conclusions supported by quantitative evidence, and the ability to communicate those arguments utilizing quantitative tools. Liberally educated students understand, reason with, and communicate quantitative information in a wide variety of contexts and everyday situations.

December graduates are also eligible to participate in the following May's exhibition and should coordinate with their faculty supervisor.

The opening reception is a formal, professional event, featuring a grand catered gathering attended by participating seniors, their families, the Eastern community, and the public. The Senior Art Exhibition showcases a wide range of media, including paintings, drawings, illustrations, sculptures, printmaking, installation, interactive media, animation, and more. Since 2020, the exhibition has also been available online, featuring professionally photographed images and original digital files of the students' work, allowing for greater accessibility and reach.




The Student Art Gallery
