# Eastern Ad Hoc Budget Committee Minutes April 29, 2021 Via Web Ex 9 a.m.

Meeting commenced at 9:30 a.m.

#### 1. Approval of Previous Meeting Minutes

The minutes of the February 10, 2021, meeting were approved.

#### 2. Welcome and General Update – E. Nűńez

- E. Nűńez thanked the committee for their work with NECHE. The team has completed their report, and it will now go to the commission for a vote. Once approved, the final report will be posted on Eastern's website.
- E. Nűńez informed the committee that the University contracted with TNG to conduct an independent review of the University's Title IX practices and procedures.
- E. Nũńez stated that enrollment is down due to COVID, and this is impacting the budget.

#### 3. Enrollment Update – W. Salka

- W. Salka reviewed Attachment A, Ad Hoc Budget Committee Enrollment Report. He reported that:
  - Compared to last year, total enrollment is lower, and spring third-week enrollment is down 10.7 percent. This is partially due to full-time students shifting to part-time, and a reversal is expected in the fall.
  - While hard to project fall enrollment due to COVID, incoming first-year and transfers are up 2%
  - There was a loss of 169 students from fall to spring, and there are 677 students not yet registered for fall.
  - First-year deposits are up 2.6%.
- J. DeLapp asked how debt free community college affected enrollment. W. Salka said that due to the many program restrictions, it did not affect Eastern's fall and spring enrollment.

#### 4. Eastern Connecticut State University Financial Update – J. Howarth

#### J. Howarth advised the committee that:

- He is gathering information for the FY 22 budget. He does not yet know the amount of reserves we will need to use.
- He is currently assessing housing and food service revenue based on new enrollment numbers.
- There is a \$236,000 reduction in state funding.
- The vice presidents are preparing FY 22 budget requests. These will include a high percentage of personnel and operating costs. The fuel cell project, located by Admissions, is projected to save between \$400,000 and \$600,000 each year in energy costs.
- Eastern will complete FY 21 without using any additional reserves due to coronavirus relief funds and reductions in student workers and part-time staff.

#### J. Howarth reviewed:

- Attachment B, Higher Education Emergency Relief Funds which shows we have received a total of \$13,238,161 for FY 21.
- Attachment C which explains how we spent the \$23,480,695 received in COVID relief funds for students and the institution.
- Attachment D which shows how we spent the \$3,752,726 COVID relief funds received from the state.

#### 5. <u>Human Resources Update – K. DeLisa</u>

K. DeLisa reviewed Attachment E, Personnel Changes Since 2-10-21. He stated that there have been three new hires, one resignation, two retirements, and one death. The hiring freeze is still in effect with the exception of health and safety positions. Vice presidents are currently reviewing operating budgets to identify savings, particularly in part-time areas like UAs and student workers. If full-time staff can be redeployed, there is a good chance of dealing with the tough budget situation and coming out of it in a good financial shape.

#### 6. General

- L. Runksmeier asked if there has been any thought to moving funds in strategic ways to help students with reengagement. E. Nűńez responded that she is meeting with new SGA president and will proposed the use of \$200,000 in student activities and student engagement.
- J. Wilson asked about the house on Windham Street Extension. E. Nűńez explained that the University recently took ownership. The roads will be paved and Eastern entry signs installed. The exterior of the house is being repaired using \$500,000 in bond funds while the interior will be repaired at a later date when funds are available. For now, the house will be locked.

The meeting adjourned at 10:35 a.m.
