

With background knowledge in Spanish, you can quickly and efficiently earn college credit toward a Spanish degree. Your familiarity with the language is likely to help you participate and complete your coursework successfully.

A Spanish major has some of the fewest requirements of all majors at Eastern (only 33 credits!), making it easier to pursue a double major.

Moreover, you can take the College Level Exam Program (CLEP) and earn up to 12 credits with a simple test. These credits can put you well on your way to earning a 15-credit Spanish minor or 33-credit double major, and at a fraction of the cost of regular credit hours.
